

Map and Driving Direction



RESOURCE CENTER

The Resource Center is a part of the Hmong Cultural Center. Like the Hmong Cultural Center, it is open from Monday through Friday from 9AM to 6PM. The Resource Center is physically divided into two parts: the library and the artifact exhibition. It also offers a presentation that promotes cross-cultural understanding called Building Bridges.

LIBRARY

The Resource Center Library carries a wide variety of materials including books (Hmong, English, French), news articles, periodicals, academic dissertations, journals, videos, DVDs, and cassettes. Most of the mentioned materials are historical and academic production; however, we do have entertainment-type materials as well. ARTIFACT EXHIBITION

The Resource Center Artifact Exhibition puts on display a wide range of Hmong cultural objects. Some of these are the original pieces, some are the new reproductions, and some are miniature replicas of the larger objects. The exhibition carries many items of practical daily use like hammers, sickles, axes, and pipes. It also displays artistic pieces such as cloths, costumes, bodily decorative objects, and musical instruments.



BUILDING BRIDGES PRESENTATION

The presentation is a multi-cultural educational program specifically designed to introduce the Hmong people and way of life to the non-Hmong visitors. The program targets both teenage and adult audiences; however, many of the visitors in the past have been groups of university and high school students on cultural trips accompanied by their professors.

The main purpose of this presentation is to pin-point, elaborate, and reconcile the cultural differences between the mainstream American culture and the Hmong traditional culture. It is specially designed to clear out the cultural misunderstanding and stereotypical pre-judgment, and subsequently to help bridge the existing cultural gap between the two groups.

The presentation is made by the senior Hmong staffs. Generally the presentation is made at the Resource Center with prior appointment but the staff occasionally bring their presentation to other places as well, usually upon requests from the clients.
