HMONG CULTURAL CENTER MISSION AND PROGRAMS

Established in 1992, Hmong Cultural Center's Mission is to promote the personal development of children, youth, and adults through Hmong cultural education while providing resources that enhance cross-cultural awareness and understanding between Hmong and Non-Hmong persons.

Vision Statement: Human Rights Focus - the Hmong Cultural Center and its Resource Center works to advance the human rights of Hmong interacting with mainstream institutions and systems across the United States as it educates non-Hmong professionals and service workers about the background and culturally-specific needs of their Hmong service populations.

<u>Multicultural Education and Race Relations Outreach Programs to Promote Cross-Cultural Understanding Between Hmong and non-Hmong</u>

Hmong Resource Center: The Hmong Resource Center is a heavily utilized program that provides community outreach activities related to multicultural education for the purposes of promoting positive race relations in the Minneapolis-St. Paul community. Hundreds of individual college and secondary school students and community members such as educators and health and medical professionals use the Resource Center each year to find information about the Hmong. The Resource Center also publishes a Hmong Studies scholarly journal and compiles and disseminates its own Hmong-related social science research in relation to important socioeconomic and social justice issues. All of these activities are intended to improve understanding and group relations between Hmong and non-Hmong while also improving the ability of core institutions in the mainstream society to serve Hmong-Americans in a culturally competent manner. The Hmong Resource Center served 1,427 onsite visitors in 2005. Many more used the center's website to learn about Hmong-related resources.

Building Bridges: Teaching about the Hmong in Our Communities Program:

To respond to the need for community education about the Hmong refugee experience, Hmong refugees from Wat Tham Krabok and Hmong contributions to Minnesota and the United States, the Hmong Cultural Center's Building Bridges race relations outreach program provides comprehensive and interactive multicultural education presentations about the Hmong to groups in the Twin Cities community and Greater Minnesota. The Building Bridges program is intended to promote dialogue and understanding and reduce stereotypes that divide our communities. The Building Bridges program served more than 2,000 persons with multicultural education presentations in 2005, many of these attendees worked in the Education, Health, or Social Services field.

Adult Education and Literacy Programs to promote the personal development and selfsufficiency of Hmong adults in American Society

Citizenship Program: This program prepares adults for their citizenship exams by teaching them about American laws, history and government while tutoring them for their citizenship interviews.

ESL Program: This program teaches adults Basic English vocabulary and grammar as well as workforce skills such as computer keyboarding. The Adult Education programs provided about 33,000 hours of instruction to refugee adults in 2005

<u>Educational Programs to promote the personal development, self-esteem, and social</u> skills of Children, Youth and Adults

Qeej Musical Instrument and Dance Programs: This after-school program teaches children and youth, aged 6 to 18, how to play the qeej musical instrument and traditional qeej songs, and how to perform qeej dances. The Qeej instrument is an important cultural identifier for the Hmong people and plays an intrinsic role in Hmong funerals. This program helps reconnect children and youth to the culture of their parents. The Qeej program also includes guest speakers on important youth issues and academic enrichment activities for children and youth. The dance program provides instruction to children and youth in traditional Hmong and Asian dances. The Qeej and Dance program served about 80 children and youth in 2005

Hmoob Kab Lis Kev Cai (Cultural Customs): This 12 year old program teaches adults and youth traditional songs and rituals associated with the Mej Koob (the traditional Marriage Ceremony) and Kev Pam Tuag (Funeral Customs). 20 adults and youth were served by the Cultural Customs program in 2006.
