## **Adult Basic Education**

The Hmong Cultural Center served 279 students in the English as a Second Language program and Citizenship program in 2012. The English as a Second Language program helps students to improve their English language literacy and proficiency, workforce readiness and computer literacy. The Citizenship Program prepares students for the naturalization test by teaching American history, government, civics and how to be a productive citizen of the United States.

## Youth Enrichment

The Qeej program has been around for 20 years. Students learn the Qeej every Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 4 - 6 PM. The Qeej program provides instruction to students in the art of playing the instrument and related dances. The Qeej is a cultural symbol, used in Hmong funeral rituals and for entertainment purposes at festivals. In 2012, there were 45 students who participated in the program.

#### **Cultural Customs**

60 adult students participated in this program in 2012. Students are trained in the orally recited songs and ceremonies associated with Hmong Weddings and Funerals. These classes are taught in the Hmong language. Mission Statement: Established in 1992, the Hmong Cultural Center's mission is to promote the personal development of children, youth, and adults through Hmong cultural education while providing resources that enhance cross-cultural education and understanding between Hmong and non-Hmong persons.

• The Expansion of the Hmong 101 Multicultural Education Program to the Internet through Webinar Technology to serve Educators and Service Providers working with Hmong Populations in Wisconsin, California, North Carolina, Michigan, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, Alaska and other States with Emerging Hmong Populations

• The recent translation from Hmong to English and publication of *Hmong Wedding Procedures* and *Hmong Funeral Procedures* with support from the Minnesota Historical Society, the first time this important Hmong cultural information has been available in detail in the English language for the younger generation of Hmong and interested non-Hmong

Hmong Cultural Center will be engaging in an important strategic planning process in 2013 to determine the future direction of our programs as our community changes. The Hmong Resource Center Library has the largest collection of Hmongrelated theses, dissertations, and journal articles of any institution in the United H States. The library also provides community outreach activities related to multicultural education for the purpose of promoting positive race relations, and cross Lcultural understanding between Hmong and non-Hmong communities. In 2012, 463 individuals utilized the Resource Library's collection for research and learning. A

Each year for the purpose of advancing cross-cultural awareness and enhancing the cultural competence of service professionals who work with the Hmong community, the Hmong Cultural Center provides multicultural education presentations about the Hmong people, their history and culture and contributions to the U.S. There were over 200 individuals from the Twin-Cities, and Western Wisconsin who have participated in Hmong 101 workshops and webinars from Hmong Cultural Center in 2012.
